



This year, the Philippine government, through the Commission of Higher Education (CHED) has made a huge scholarship investment for faculty who might be affected by the K-12 Transition Program. One of these is the Sectoral Engagement Program where faculty will no longer report to school for 10 months but will serve in any chosen industry.

Dr. Lourdes R. Diasnes and I came to UFI to basically witness how actual work is done from the ground and how this can be aligned against the theories taught in classrooms. This is very relevant because we can input more case study lessons, learn from the industry and incorporate these experiences to enhance microeconomic principles in class.

Our specific UFI engagement is with the model school. We participate in the discourses about how to improve operations and functioning of the model school through the implementation of the UFI programs. Monitoring the progress of the programs and activities, we also perform assessments, evaluation and impact measurements. The objective is to gauge the least and quantify the most how effective UFI interventions are to learning, academic performance and overall wellbeing.

'Wonderful' is the perfect word appropriate to describe our experience with UFI. We plan, think, discuss, act and work solely for others - the beneficiaries. Everyday office dialogues and deliberations cater only to what the beneficiaries need; what and how else UFI could possibly extend more its help and trainings in order to optimize development at the individual and household level.



I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Uygongco Foundation, Inc. which comprise the Statements of Financial Condition as af December 31, 2016 and 2015 and Statements of Activities and Fund Balances, Statements of Changes in Fund Balances and Statements of Cash Flows for the years then ended and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In my opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Uygongco Foundation, Inc. as at December 31, 2016 and 2015, and of its financial performance for the years then ended in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Standards in the Philippines (GAAP)

### Basis for Opinion

I conducted my audits in accordance with Philippine Standards on Auditing (PSA's). My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I am independent of the Association in accordance with Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants in the Philippines, and I have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit continon

### Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles in the Philippines, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. 
