
# **UFI Model School Project**




# **Our COVID-19 Initiatives**



# **Maka-Bata Project**



Mariphil is a German organization accredited by the German Government that caters to individuals from Germany ages 18 years old and above to do volunteer service in other countries for community immersion for one year.

To help motivate the children to stay in school to finish their education and to sustain the program, this years Mariphil Volunteers took the initiative to lead a project called **Maka-Bata**.

This fundraising campaign encourages individuals, especially German nationals, to send a child to school by supporting a child financially for the feeding and financial assistance program of the Foundation.

The project has started for SY 2020-2021 and to date, **seven individuals** from Germany sponsored seven Grade 2 children from Don Pedro Vasquez Memorial School located in Jordan, Guimaras.

# **PhilCV Partnership**



A COVID-19 information campaign was conducted through the partnership of UFI and the Philippine Coalition on Volunteerism (PhilCV). **₱30,000** was granted to UFI to spearhead the information campaign on COVID-19 to more than 1,500 individuals in Guimaras, Iloilo City and Capiz. Audio-Visual information campaigns and brochures were made and translated to Hiligaynon.

For feebacking, online discussion was conducted through Facebook Messenger for those with internet connection. Face to face discussion was also conducted while observing the IATF safety protocols. Brochures were also given to the different barangays around Iloilo City and to the employees of LFUG GoC. Facemasks were also distributed to individuals.







A webinar on "Volunteering at the Time of Pandemic 2.0: Ano ang Tugon ng ating Sektor?" was held on October 23, via Zoom. The webinar features experiences, learnings, and recommendations on how volunteering-involving organizations, corporate and aovernment COVID-19 provided interventions towards building community resilience, whilst ensuring that volunteers are not unduly exposed to high risk situations and upholding our duty to care.

UFI Executive Director, Pia Uygongco, acted as resource speaker for Visayas area with the topic: Valuing "Bayanihan" Spirit to Increase "Community Resilience" to COVID-19. UFI

### **INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT**

#### TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES Uygongco Foundation Inc.

#### **Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements**

#### Opinion

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of **Uygongco Foundation Inc.** which comprise the Statements of Financial Condition as of December 31, 2020 and 2019 and Statements of Activities and Fund Balances, Statements of Changes in Fund Balances and Statements of Cash Flows for the years then ended and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In my opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of **Uygongco Foundation Inc.** as at December 31, 2020 and 2019, and of its financial performance for the years then ended in accordance with Philippine Financial Reporting Standards for Small Entities (PFRS for SEs).

#### **Basis for Opinion**

I conducted my audits in accordance with Philippine Standards on Auditing (PSAs). My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I am independent of the Foundation in accordance with Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants in the Philippines, and I have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinion.

#### Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Philippine Financial Reporting Standards for Small Entities (PFRS for SEs) in the Philippines, and or such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Foundation ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Foundation or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Foundation financial reporting process.

#### Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit for the Financial Statements

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud of error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but it is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with PSAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists.

Misstatement can arise from fraud or error and are consider material if, individually or in aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with PSAs, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, of the override of intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Foundation internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the resonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Foundation ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material in certainty exists, I am required to draw attention in auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Foundation to cease to continue as a going concern.

I communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among others, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.

#### **Report on the Supplementary Information Required Under Revenue Regulations** 15-2010 of the Bureau of Internal Revenue

My audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole. The supplementary information on taxes, duties and licenses fees in the last page of the Notes to the financial statements is presented for purposes of filing with the Bureau of Internal Revenue and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of the management. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedure applied in my audit of the basic financial statements. In my opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.
